




To: Antrim County Board of Commissioners

Re: Commission on Aging FY-2017 Annual Report

Join Commissioner Ricksgers on a Home Delivered Meal route, volunteer at our welcome table at lunch time, join one of our activities like Chair Exercise or Wii Bowling, ride along for home assessments, sign up to take a trip to the Lavender Farm or just come have lunch at any of our meal sites, or even better - visit all of them. Each one has its own unique characteristics. I encourage you to have a conversation with some of our seniors while you are here and find out what is important to them, as we plan for the future of their Commission on Aging. I have, once again, included a list and short description of the services we provide throughout the county, within this report, but until you have that personal contact with the recipients, receive their hugs, see the smiles, share their tears, you really don't get a true picture of how our programs make a difference in the lives of people we serve.

On that note, I appreciate your trust in the information I bring forward to you on behalf of the seniors and would also like to thank you for your support in carrying out the work of the COA. While the processes can be daunting at times, I have always felt listened to and respected by my Board of Advisors, the County Administrator and his staff, other County Offices and Agencies, as well as you - the Commissioners.

As the Baby Boomers begin to age into service eligibility and changes come about with private insurances and Medicare, I expect that we will see many changes, not just in the number of seniors that we serve, but in the types of services we provide and the ways in which we provide them. If you are involved with senior services, in any way, you no doubt have heard the term "Person-Centered" thinking and/or planning. Our most recent plans focus on the way that most seniors want to age - with more dignity, more choices and in their own homes and communities. New senior programming promotes community inclusion and engagement that allows individuals to participate in activities, events and work to the extent they desire, throughout their lives and including end of life. We acknowledge that disability, chronic disease and advanced illness bring their own set of criteria for quality of life and we work to support programming that will assist seniors to navigate the challenges of aging, improve health and gain / sustain economic security.

ANTRIM COUNTY COMMISSION ON AGING SERVES THE PEOPLE OF ANTRIM COUNTY IN THE FOLLOWING WAYS...

Information and Assistance: Call us at 231-533-8703 between 8:30 am and 4:30 pm, M – F, for information about specific services and how to access programs and agencies throughout the county and state.

Loan Closet for DME (Durable Medical Equipment): FREE and available to all individuals over the age of 55 who require items such as wheelchairs, canes, commodes, bath seats, electric scooters (we have 7 now) and more.

Congregate Meals: Four Nutrition sites serving hot, freshly cooked meals in Bellaire, Central Lake, Elk Rapids and Mancelona.

Home Delivered Meals: Delivered Monday through Friday, with frozen options for second daily meals or weekends, for eligible seniors who are unable to obtain or prepare nutritious meals on their own.

Dining Out @ Shirley's & BC Pizza: Purchase coupons at one of our congregate sites for \$3 each and have the ability to "eat out" at one of these establishments using the coupon for payment - add a tip and enjoy your meal.

Senior Project Fresh: A program offered through the USDA which provides \$20 for qualifying seniors (60+) to purchase locally grown produce from Farmer's Markets and roadside stands.

Respite Care: A Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA) provides care for your loved one on a regularly scheduled day and time during the week - giving full time caregivers a much needed break.

Personal Care Services: CNA provides in-home assistance with activities of daily living such as bathing, grooming, dressing, transferring, toileting, etc.

Homemaker Service (for homebound individuals): Routine household tasks to maintain a clean and healthy living environment for homebound individuals with functional limitations.

Project Lifesaver: A program designed for individuals who are in danger of wandering away from home and would be unable to find their way back. A wristband with a GPS device makes it possible for local police to locate the wearer quickly in the event that they are missing.

HomeChore Program: Snow removal.

In-Home Homechore): Installation of smoke detectors or safety (grab) bars and other minor repairs to remedy safety issues within the home.

Trips & Activities: Chair Exercise groups, Arts and Crafts, Bingo, Cards, Wii Sports, Mah-Jongg, Book, Movie & Magazine exchanges, Picnics, Fishing, Sr. Expo and more. See our monthly newsletter (Antrim County Senior Update) for a full calendar of events.

Monthly Foot Care Clinics: Registered nurse from the health dept. provides monthly foot care for \$20 per visit.

Annual Flu Immunization Clinics: Health department provides immunizations to 3 of our 4 congregate sites annually.

Creating Confident Caregiver Classes: Helping the 24/7 caregiver to learn coping techniques as well as ways to be the best caregiver they can be to their loved ones.

PATH (Personal Action Toward Health) Workshops: Important workshops that provide information, coping skills and healthy lifestyle tips to individuals living with chronic diseases/conditions.

AARP Volunteer Tax Assistance: A free service, provided by volunteers at Elk Rapids, Mancelona & Bellaire sites.

MMAP Counselors: Trained in **Medicaid** and **Medicare** to help recipients apply for, compare, enroll in and understand everything that is involved with Medicare Part A, B and D (Prescription Coverage), as well as supplemental and Advantage plans (Part C).

Options Counseling: Assistance with Advance Directives, Five Wishes, Planning for Life Changes or Living Situations, etc.

Volunteer Opportunities: As a not-for-profit county agency, we utilize volunteers on a large-scale basis. Inquire at our office located at 308 E. Cayuga to find the opportunity that would best suit your talents. We can always use Meals on Wheels volunteers.


Hall Rentals: Residents of Kearney or Forest Home Twp: Sun – Thurs (afternoon or evening) \$100, Fri or Sat \$200. Non-Residents of Kearney or Forest Home Twp: Sun – Thurs (afternoon or evening) \$150, Fri or Sat \$300.

Monthly Newsletter: Antrim County Senior Update is mailed out monthly (suggested donation of \$5 annually) and includes information on all of our programs, events and menus as well as information on such things as nutrition or local scams. 

CLIENTS PROVIDED **IN-HOME SERVICES** IN FY-2017 BY TOWNSHIP




CLIENTS PROVIDED **MEALS-ON-WHEELS** IN FY-2017 BY TOWNSHIP









Clients Served (Unduplicated)





ANTRIM COUNTY COMMISSION ON AGING
DEFINITION OF INCOME – TO BE USED IN DETERMINING FEE FOR SERVICES

For the purpose of determining hourly fee (subsidy) for Antrim County Commission on Aging in-home care services, income includes total annual cash receipts before taxes and deductions from all sources, such as:

- Wages and salaries before any deductions;
- Net receipts from non-farm self -employment (receipts from a person’s own unincorporated business, professional enterprise, or partnership, after deductions for business expenses);
- Net receipts from farm self-employment (receipts from a farm which one operates as an owner, renter, or sharecropper, after deductions for farm operating expenses);
- Regular payments from social security, railroad retirement, unemployment compensation, strike benefits from union funds, workers’ compensation, veterans’ payments, public assistance (including Aid to Families, Supplemental Security Income, and non-Federally-funded General Assistance or General Relief money payments), and training stipends;
- Alimony, child support, and military family allotments or other regular support from an absent family member or someone not living in the household;
- Private pensions, government employee pensions (including military retirement pay), and regular insurance or annuity payments;
- College or university scholarships, grants, fellowships, and assistantships; and
- Dividends, interest, net rental income, net royalties, periodic receipts from estates or trusts, and net gambling or lottery winnings.

Income does not include the following types of money received:

- Capital gains;
- Any assets drawn down as withdrawals from a bank, the sale of property, a house, or a car; and
- Tax refunds, gifts, loans, lump-sum inheritances, one-time insurance payments, or compensation for injury.

Also excluded are noncash benefits, noted below:


- Employer-paid or union-paid portion of health insurance or other employee fringe benefits;
- Food or housing received in lieu of wages;
- The value of food and fuel produced and consumed on farms;
- The imputed value of rent from owner-occupied non-farm or farm housing; and
- Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, school lunches, and housing assistance.

The C.O.A. Director has the authority to utilize her/his discretion on a case by case basis and may request additional documentation to determine the appropriate fee.
