# ANIMAL CONTROL

## ANIMAL CONTROL

### In Summary

These charts represent the last six years at the Antrim County Animal Shelter. Starting in 2010 we show a steady decline in our intake of animals at 939 in 2010 to a record breaking 525 in 2015. Our euthanasia rate for 2015 is at 23% of our total intakes and is down 3% from 2014. In 2010 the euthanasia rate was 35%. Although we are not considered a “no kill” animal shelter, we are able to say we have only had to euthanize feral, dangerous, sick and unadoptable animals in 2015. We have not had to euthanize due to overcrowding at all.

We operate as an open intake facility turning no Antrim County resident away when they need to bring in their unwanted pet, stray, or live trapped feral cat into the shelter at no charge.

Although at first the concern was that the shelter would be crowded and euthanasia would greatly increase, we found the opposite to be true. The number of feral (wild) cats in the community has been reduced and unwanted unadoptable animals are no longer on the street reproducing and contributing to the problem. We believe this is one reason why our numbers continue to decline. Unwanted animals have a place to go.

We spend a lot of time advertising our adoptable and stray animals on several websites including Facebook and Petfinder and continue to see great success from this. We also closely monitor Craigslist for lost or found pet posts, contributing to many animals being returned to their owners. Often stray pets are posted on Facebook using a mobile iphone by the road officer and claimed by their owner before the lost pet even arrives at the shelter.

We also offer the public the opportunity to text photos of their lost pets and post them to our website as a service to help them be reunited with their pets. Social media has played an amazing role in adopting, returning and generally helping animals. It also has helped with community awareness.

We also continue to spend a lot of time grooming, bathing, flea treating and training animals in our facility.

All animals both stray and adoptable are photographed and posted daily. We work closely with local veterinarians and local rescue groups. Donors such as Merrie Corbett with Adams Madams in Central Lake and Shorts Brewery have donated thousands of dollars to local veterinarians for spaying and neutering, flea control and other medical needs for shelter animals.

We have also had a donor donate all of the dog food expected to be needed in 2016. Rescue groups such as With a Little Help from my Friends regularly come and take one or two animals from our facility to adopt in their sanctuary. AC PAW is also active in several counties in Northern Michigan helping intercept and place homeless animals into new homes. These groups also regularly help with adoptable animals facing long recovery periods due to medical issues.

There is an officer patrolling the county four to six hours a day, five days a week. Often we are able to solve a lot of the problems found by educating and working with the citizens. We believe our presence in the community and our availability has contributed to the number of complaints going down significantly over the years.

In summary, it has been another successful year at Animal Control. We appear to be on the right track to growing to meet the needs of Antrim County citizens and domestic animals.



# GUN REGISTRATION / CPL

## GUN REGISTRATION / CPL

New CPL's (Concealed Pistol License) issued during 2015 totaled 159, while 189 were renewal, compared to 108 New CPL in 2014, and 210 renewals. Five (5) CPL were suspended, and one (1) was revoked, three (3) were refused, one (1) reinstated, and fourteen (14) were exempt (Law Enforcement).

Purchase permits (without CPL) totaled 642 in 2015 compared to 409 in 2014, while 471 Pistol Sales Records (With CPL) were recorded in 2015, an increase from 314 in 2014.





A total of (13) Livery inspections were conducted with 93 boats inspected.






